Special General Meeting - January 27, 2016

Dear Colleagues,

As you are aware, the CLA Executive Council has been working with the Future Federation Working Group (Working Group) on the development of a proposal to replace the CLA with a federation consisting of library associations from across the country.

Canada Post continues to support Library Materials Rate

Canada Post continues to support Canadian libraries by providing reduced postal rates for mailing library materials by libraries to their users and other libraries. On January 11, 2016, Canada Post will increase library materials rates by a weighted average of 5 per cent. Even with the increase, the rates continue to be substantially lower than our most discounted commercial parcel rates. A 1.28-kg package mailed at the library materials rate today costs \$1.12 to cover sending and returning the materials; this will increase to \$1.18 in January 2016. Without the library materials rate, the same service would cost approximately \$23.00 if mailed at a post office.

Important Notice re: Library Materials Shipping Tool Reminder of new method of payment for customers using postage meters

In August, Parcel Services customers using meters as a method of payment for their parcels were advised that on January 11, 2016, Canada Post and meter vendors would introduce Supplier Account (previously communicated as Third-Party Account). This is a new way to pay for your parcels when using the Electronic Shipping Tools (EST), Library Shipping Tool or other approved electronic shipping platforms.

Supplier Account will allow meter customers to pay for parcels by accessing the funds from the same account they use to fill their postage meter and to print barcoded labels for parcels instead of meter impressions and separate address labels. Starting January 11, 2016, customers are encouraged to switch to <u>Supplier Account</u>. Effective July 1, 2016, meters as a method of payment will no longer be available in EST, Library Shipping Tool and other approved electronic shipping platforms.

Please refer to the Supplier Account handout for more information. Note: On January 11, 2016, meter will no longer be an accepted method of payment option when using manual order documents (manifests or bills of lading). If you are using manual shipping documents, we encourage you to switch to an automated shipping platform.

Library Materials Shipping Tool

The Canadian Library Association (CLA) has released a new Statement on Intellectual Freedom and libraries.

This new Statement replaces the previous 30 year old Position Statement on Intellectual Freedom. The Statement seeks to provide a broader national and international context for the role of libraries in ensuring intellectual freedom as well as a framework for Canadian libraries to provide, defend, and promote equitable access to the widest possible variety of expressive content and resist calls for censorship and the adoption of systems that deny or restrict access to resources.

"I am very excited to have had the privilege of shepherding a revised statement of intellectual freedom principles on behalf of the Canadian Library Association" stated Alvin Schrader, Chair Intellectual Freedom Advisory Committee. "I am indebted to Community members who provided valuable feedback on an earlier draft and to my intellectual freedom advisory committee members for their contributions."

The CLA would like to thank the hard work of Alvin Schrader and the CLA Intellectual Freedom Advisory Committee in reviewing and updating this core statement for the library and information community. "The Committee has presented a strong and compelling update to one of the library field's most important value statements," noted Sandra Singh, President of the Canadian Library Association. "Without the active vigilance of librarians and library workers across this country, there is always a risk of slow erosion to the fundamental information rights protected through intentional and active adoption of statements such as this."

How Does The New Policy Influence Us In Our Daily Learning Commons Adventures?

This revised series supports the Alberta Learning Commons Policy with ideas, tools, and participant activities in a series of 6 webinars framed on using A Guide to Support Implementation, Essential Conditions. The series is in three parts in order to allow participants to use the information in their learning commons developments over a period of time in their schools. The Prix du XXe siècle celebrates design quality and enduring excellence, recognizing buildings that continue to be used as designed or that have successfully accommodated new uses without being altered in ways that detract from the original design intent. Call for Chapter Proposals: Successful Campus Outreach Programs and Activities for Academic Libraries

Academic libraries use campus outreach activities and programs as well as marketing efforts to raise student awareness of services and resources, to create a welcoming environment in the library, and to teach information literacy skills. They also reach out to faculty to promote collections, to support curriculum development and faculty research, and to integrate information literacy into courses. In a climate of great challenges to higher education and increasing pressures on all campus units to assess and justify their services, effective outreach and marketing can also help "tell the story" of the library to administrators and ensure the library remains central to campus intellectual life. Library outreach to alums and the broader community can also help a college or university demonstrate its relevance and value to those beyond the borders of campus.

This volume will bring together research on academic library outreach and marketing including empirical papers, theoretical discussions, comparative analyses, and in-depth case studies. As a compendium of best practices from around the world, it will serve as a resource for academic librarians, library science students, and administrators to discover new programming ideas, to learn principles of effective marketing, and to help them think strategically and programmatically about outreach activities of all types.
