CLA Special Election 2015 for Two Vacant Councilors - at - Large Positions
Term June 2015 - June 2017

DUE: March 22, 2015

In any membership based organization, all governance activities involve a balance of rights and obligations of the members. Elections are a prime example: members have the right to stand for elected positions, and the right to vote for candidates; they also have the obligation to put themselves forward as candidates when possible, and the obligation to exercise their vote. Good governance depends on active participation by all members.

We are seeking nominations for two (2) positions on the CLA Executive Council. This Special Election is being held to fill two vacancies created by the resignation of two councilors. Members have been appointed until June 2015 however and election is required to fill those roles beyond that date. The elected individuals will start their terms immediately following the Annual General Meeting (June 4, 2015) and will end their terms immediately following the AGM in in June 2017. The nominees shall be Personal Members of the Association in good standing since December 31 of the previous year (December 31, 2014).

Canadian Library Association: A Proposed New Vision for our National Association Frequently Asked Questions

Background:

In January 2015, the Canadian Library Association Executive Council issued a paper entitled Canadian Library Association: A Proposed New Vision for Our National Association. This paper discusses the history of CLA, its achievements and current challenges, all within the context of the very complex Canadian library association landscape. The paper presents a recommended new model for CLA: a federated association - of - associations. The recommended governance of this proposed federation is the provincial/territorial multi-sector library associations and the national sector associations. The paper discusses the federation model at a very conceptual level, recognizing that many details would need to be determined by the proposed governance

representatives.

CLA Executive convened a meeting of national associations, national sector associations, and provincial/territorial multi-sector associations on January 31, 2015 to determine if there is interest in such an approach. The discussion was wide - ranging and, in the end there was general agreement that an agile and focussed national voice for libraries and issues affecting libraries in Canada is critical. We also heard a willingness to continue to further explore the federated model for CLA, recognizing that the direct membership model is no longer sustainable for our country's national association.

This Stakeholder Group agreed that a smaller Working Group should be formed to further detail membership, governance, and financial features of the proposal, creating a Version 2 of the proposal ("revised proposal"). The Working Group will be formed in March 2015 with an aim to bring recommendations for a revised proposal back to the Stakeholder Group for discussion in June 2015. Once the Stakeholder Group has agreed upon the composition of the revised proposal, then the revised proposal will be drafted and issued to the library associations' memberships for comment and feedback.

Canadian Library Association: Code of Conduct Task Group

The CLA Code of Conduct Task Group has begun meeting and we are seeking your input. The basic mandate of the Group is to:

1. develop a code of conduct for the CLA conference and other CLA events;
2. make recommendations to Executive Council regarding application of the code of conduct.

The members of the Group are: Nancy E. Black, Gillian Byrne, Gerry Burger-Martindale, Donna Presz, and Mike Ridley.

At our initial meeting we discussed core professional and ethical principles and agreed that a code developed as a result of this process should be: concise, clear, actionable, respectful of differences, positive, and proactive, and should complement and align with existing organization policies and position statements (in particular the CLA Statement on Intellectual Freedom).

We reviewed a number of existing codes (e.g. ALA, OLA, AdaCamp) as well as procedure documents such as that created by OLA. We believe two documents are necessary: a document that describes expectations for respectful, professional conduct and a document that outlines procedures for resolution. Should a problem arise, the code should provide an informal means of resolution avoiding the need to move towards a more formal process.

Other issues discussed, although no decisions taken, include the possible need for exceptions to the policy (the AdaCamp policy described this), the importance of due process in formal complaints, respecting confidentiality, and clear definitions. We are aware that many organizations in recent years have developed codes and we will seek out their experiences.

The Group would like to see the Code become a visible feature of CLA sanctioned events and component of communications with speakers and participants as soon as possible. As a result we are working towards an approved Code for the June CLA conference in Ottawa. Our timeline is short:

Late February: initial consultation with members

April: draft to CLA Executive Council and members for comments

May: recommended code and procedures for approval by CLA Executive Council

We seek your experiences/input with codes of conduct and or issues regarding behaviour at conferences. The Task Group is interested in receiving your comments regarding the Code of Conduct. We are especially interested in principles, specific language or procedures that in your experience are important or effective.

CLA Challenges Survey for 2014 Calendar Year

This is the 9th annual survey of challenges to library materials and policies that is being conducted by the CLA Intellectual Freedom Advisory Committee.

Your responses will help inform the Committee's policy and advocacy work on behalf of the CLA membership. Results are shared widely, for example, with the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions, the Book and Periodical Council [of Canada], and the Office of Intellectual Freedom of the American Library Association. An anonymized version of the database is available without charge to anyone requesting it.

The purpose of the survey is to gather data about the nature and outcomes of challenges to library materials and policies (e.g., collection management, access to Internet and facilities) initiated in publicly funded, Canadian libraries (e.g., public, school, academic, and government) between JANUARY 1 and DECEMBER 31, 2014.

One form should be submitted for each challenge to an item or a policy.

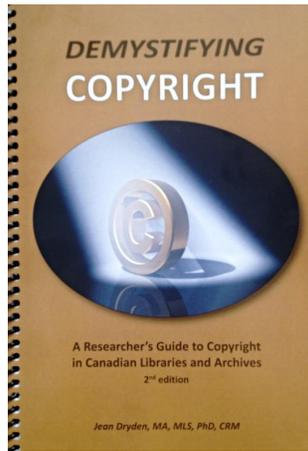

Much has changed since the first edition of Demystifying Copyright was published in 2001. In the years that followed, the federal government embarked on a process of copyright reform to fulfill Canada's obligations under international copyright treaties and to address how copyright operates in the digital environment. Some minor amendments to the Copyright Act we made in 2004, and the Act was significantly amended in 2012, when Copyright Modernization Act was passed. The amendments discussed in this edition came into force 7 November 2012.

This second edition reflects the key changes to Canada's copyright law since 2004 that are of particular relevance to people who conduct research in the nation's libraries and archives, and to the librarians and archivists who serve them.

IFLA Publishes "Guidelines for Library Services to Persons with Dyslexia - Revised and Extended"

The IFLA Guidelines for Library Services to Persons with Dyslexia - Revised and extended - aims to offer guidance to IFLA professional units and all its members worldwide on developing and implementing library services for persons with dyslexia. These guidelines are both a revision and an expansion of the previous Guidelines published by IFLA in 2001 as Professional Report No. 70.

The Guidelines have been developed by an international working group working under the joint responsibility of both the Library Services to People with Special Needs Section (LSN) and the Libraries Serving Persons with Print Disabilities Section (LPD). These new guidelines aim to assist libraries in providing services to persons with dyslexia. They can also be applied to other groups of users with reading difficulties. [Read More](#)

achieve IFLA's strategic objectives, including ensuring IFLA's advocacy strategy is relevant and flexible and that IFLA's development programs incorporate the objectives of IFLA's board and units. She will be communicating libraries' and their users' objectives to international and national bodies and representing IFLA and libraries at international forums and events, such as those related to digital access, copyright, ebooks and issues of internet governance. Christina will be working from The Hague in the Netherlands until she returns to VPL in June 2016.
