The publication is a truly collaborative work, one that has brought school library associations, teacherlibrarians, library technicians, students, parents, classroom teachers and administrators from across all provinces and territories together to create a vision for successful school libraries in the 21st century. 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Save the Books! An Introduction to Book Repair and Preservation

This session will provide an overview of strategies to physically preserve books and paper-based resources. We will discuss various agents of deterioration as well as ways to combat them including environmental monitoring and control, as well as integrated pest management. Some simple and easy to perform book repair and paper preservation procedures including the construction of archival enclosures will be demonstrated. Specific repairs and techniques will include hinge tightening, Japanese tissue and wheat starch paste paper mends, mylar jackets and encapsulation, and custom pamphlet binders.

Understand the main elements of a comprehensive preservation management plan
Learn what causes or accelerates the deterioration of library and archival materials and preventative measures to prevent or slow down the process
Learn simple and inexpensive ways to improve the physical condition of books and paper



As part of the Internship, Jessica will have the opportunity to work at, and learn about the complexities of, an academic library while pursuing a fully-funded Master's degree in Library and Information Science (MLIS) or a Master's in

Knowledge Management (MKM).

Obituary

Erik Spicer (1926-2014)

Mr. Erik Spicer, Parliamentary Librarian Emeritus, past president of the Canadian Library Association, and library advocate, died in Ottawa on September 27, 2014.

Mr. Spicer began his long and illustrious career as a librarian in the public library services of Toronto, Hamilton and Ottawa and at the university libraries of Victoria and Michigan before becoming Assistant Librarian and Deputy Chief Librarian at the Ottawa Public Library. He continued there until his appointment as Parliamentary Librarian of Canada by Prime Minister John Diefenbaker in 1960 and was the first professionally trained librarian to hold the position.

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Professor John Wilkinson (1927-2014)

Peacefully, on Sunday, September 28, 2014 with family by his side, at the age of 87. John was a proud graduate of University of Toronto Schools, University of Toronto, and University of Chicago (PhD) and was Professor of Information and Library Science at University of Toronto for decades. He was a peerless storyteller with a deep and vibrant intellect, the warmest of hearts, a rich humour, and a love of life. He will be missed by all who shared his company.
