Why Is it so Important to Vote Libraries?

Libraries are a critical piece of infrastructure contributing accessible services that have an immeasurable impact on communities across the country. Libraries are as important to the infrastructure of a community as bridges or water mains.

Libraries are centres of excellence in learning. They contribute to competitiveness in Canada and are a key pillar of educational infrastructure.

As libraries continue to grow and adapt, they address community needs that are essential to the public:

- Libraries help unemployed or underemployed people find jobs;
- They provide the community with free internet access;
- They help small businesses access marketplaces;
- They provide community residents with access to health information and in many cases access to health programs;
- Many libraries provide access to Makerspaces for gatherings and project planning; and
- They offer partnerships with culture and cultural programs.

Investment in libraries is not just a local responsibility. Libraries depend on investments from all levels of government, with leadership provided at the Federal level.

The Federal government must play a leadership role by dedicating resources that ensure we retain and protect information creating equitable access for all Canadians.

The CLA is Committed to Supporting Canadian Libraries for Fair e-Book Pricing

Demand for eBooks continues to grow rapidly - in fact, digital content is the fastest growing area of borrowing for public libraries. But multinational publishers impose unreasonably high prices, creating a barrier for public libraries to offer universal access to this content. As a result, public libraries offer fewer eBook titles, fewer copies for readers

to discover and there are often longer wait times for these materials. CLA has written to the Party Leaders as well as the Party Caucus' to ask for the party's commitment to revising current legislation which allows inflated eBook pricing to gouge Canadian libraries.



National and Provincial School Library Day

School libraries across the country will once again be celebrating National and Provincial School Library Day on Monday, October 26, 2015. This year, the day will coincide with a national movement in school libraries called "The Year of the Learning Commons" (April 2015 to May 2016). Throughout the year, educators throughout Canada and North America are celebrating the transition of their school libraries and computer labs from places that not only support the consumption of knowledge, to library learning commons that encourage everyone to create knowledge in innovative and exciting new ways.



One way many students, teachers, administrators, library staff and educational assistants will be celebrating National and Provincial School Library day is by participating in The Voices for School Libraries Network (VSLN) Drop Everything and Read Challenge (D.E.A.R.). Some provincial school library associations, such as those in British Columbia and Manitoba, have challenged all their schools to drop everything and read at 11:00 a.m. local time on this day to highlight the importance of school libraries in the educational lives of students.

Participants are encouraged to tweet about their participation in the challenge and let the country know what students are reading. Use the hashtag #canadadear2015. The Voices for

National School Library Day began in 2004 when the Canadian School Library Association and the Association of Teacher Librarians of Canada merged into the Canadian Association of School Librarians (CASL), one of CLA's 5 former divisions. It was deliberately scheduled during Canadian Library Month as part of a wider celebration of all types of Canadian libraries up until 2011 when CASL was dissolved along with the other divisions and interest groups. Since then, the CLA's Voices for School Libraries has worked hard to keep this tradition alive in Canadian schools.






