1. CLA launches research on Canada's libraries

CLA is pleased to launch the National Statistical and Values Profile of Canadian Libraries. CLA Executive Council, under past-President Karen Adams, commissioned this research to provide CLA members with a current comprehensive overview of the activities of libraries in Canada. The statistics are supported by a compilation of statements from a wide variety of sources on the value that Canada's libraries bring to society. This research will provide much needed support, in the form of both statistics and testimonials, for CLA's advocacy initiatives. Many thanks to Dr Alvin Schrader and Michael Brundin for their work to compile this report.

2. CLA Challenges Survey for 2012

This is the 7th annual survey of challenges to library materials and policies that is being conducted by the CLA Intellectual Freedom Advisory Committee.

Your responses will help inform the Committee's policy and advocacy work on behalf of the CLA membership. Results are shared widely, for example, with the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions, the Book and Periodical Council [of Canada], and the Office of Intellectual Freedom of the American Library Association. An anonymized version of the database is available without charge to anyone requesting it.

The purpose of the survey is to gather data about the nature and outcomes of challenges to library materials and policies (e.g., collection management, access to Internet and facilities) initiated in publicly funded, Canadian libraries (e.g., public, school, academic, and government) between JANUARY 1 and DECEMBER 31, 2012.



This is the second year CBC Ottawa and OPL have partnered to present the Human Library. After a hugely successful Ottawa event in 2012, the Human Library has evolved into a Canada-wide CBC initiative called **National Human Library Day**, with events taking place in 15 cities across the country on January 26.

Human Libraries provide an exciting opportunity for the public to connect one-on-one with individuals who have diverse life experiences, stories, and knowledge. Just like borrowing a book from a local library, the user can, "take out" a human book and have a conversation for approximately 20 minutes.

National Human Library Day

is a one-day event (with Winnipeg hosting a three-day event) hosted by local libraries and media and cultural centres across the country, in an effort to help dispel myths and stereotypes by creating an opportunity for one-on-one conversations between people who may never have met otherwise. Brill and IFLA are pleased to announce the **new Brill/IFLA Open Access award**.

The IFLA/Brill Open Access award is created to reward initiatives that facilitate and/or promote Open Access Scholarly Monographs in the humanities or social sciences. This is in line with IFLA's stated position on Open Access, which aims to promote open access across its membership. This is also in line with Brill's open access policy. "Open Access" in the context of this award refers to any structural publication model, where the reader does not have to pay a fee to access the leading version of a monograph and where the content is made available without embargo.

The award will be given to the person/institute behind the initiative in recognition of outstanding work and effort in facilitating, promoting, advocating, raising awareness in regard to and/or disseminating Open Access Scholarly Monographs published with an open license.

UNESCO organized an international conference <u>The Memory of the World in the Digital age: Digitization and Preservation</u>, in September 2012 in Vancouver, Canada, to explore the key issues affecting the preservation and long-term accessibility of digital documentary heritage. IFLA was represented and actively involved in this conference through the IFLA President, Ingrid Parent, the Programme Director of the Preservation and Conservation programme Christiane Baryla, and the Chair of the Copyright and other Legal Matters (CML)

We have posted reports on the CLA website from the <u>National Union Catalogue group</u> and the <u>Inter Library Loan (ILL) group</u>. The groups are seeking input on their plans; I encourage you to review the documents and forward any comments to the respective group. Each Round Table is planning another teleconference meeting in the first quarter of this year.

And I will be joining most members of Executive Council in attending the <u>OLA Super Conference</u> in Toronto next week. We look forward to seeing many CLA members there – so please take the opportunity to meet with us!
