The Study, conducted by the Conference Board of Canada, draws on the input of thousands of employers and workers from the entire cultural community in Broadcasting; Digital Media; Film and Television; Heritage; Live Performing Arts; Music and Sound Recording; Visual Arts and Crafts; and Writing and Publishing.

This is the largest HR study ever undertaken on the cultural sector in Canada.



#### **Update from the CLA Office**

## Happy new year to all!

I'm not usually one for making new year's resolutions, but I've made an exception for this year. At our last AGM, members challenged Executive Council to communicate more regularly, and I think good efforts have been made so far. But we can do more. So my resolution is to provide a monthly update from the CLA office in the Digest. This update will attempt to provide an overview of some of the key activities of CLA members and staff.

2010 ended on a bit of a buzz as CLTA President Jan Harder, Ottawa Public Library City Librarian Barbara Clubb and I had the opportunity to meet the new Governor General, David Johnston, at Ottawa City Hall. His Excellency is quite engaging – he told us that his grandchildren refer to him as "Grandpa Book"! Thanks to Jan for this chance to meet the GG, the new Mayor of Ottawa and other members of Ottawa City Council.

2011 is coming in with a roar. Last week, we posted a revised grassroots advocacy toolkit for members to contact their MPs, as parliament is on break until the end of this month. The IELA Working Group is preparing a toolkit to reinvigorate efforts for progress on equitable library access issues. Look for the launch of this toolkit later this month. Draft 2 of the CLA Future Plan has been available for consultation, and we have added the first round of FAQs to our blog. The deadline for this round of comments is today, Friday 14 January.

In the office, we are working on year end accounts; arrangements for the Halifax conference, including registration and the preliminary program; the next issue of *Feliciter*; implementing a new paper and electronic archiving structure; and membership renewals.

Membership renewals have been a challenge this year. While members are renewing, they are taking longer to respond to notices and reminders. This requires extra effort on the part of staff to maintain contact with members and ensure retention. We are looking at different ways of managing the renewal process, but we encourage all members to respond to renewal notices as early as possible.

Thanks to a campaign started by our Vice-President/President-Elect Karen Adams, a number of institutional members are opting to renew at higher membership level (either \$500 or \$1000). We will see this income adjustment through the next year as each institution reaches its renewal date. Take note: this appeal will be expanded to a wider pool of institutional members in the coming months!

#### Arts Council Takes Over Libraries, With Budgets Slashed

Arts Council England is to take over key responsibilities from the <u>Museums</u>, <u>Libraries</u> and Archives Council but will only get 75% of its budget, it was announced today.

The MLA, which handles development work for museums and the public library service, is one of the public bodies earmarked for closure by the government, in what has been dubbed a "bonfire of the quangos". ACE has revealed that it will take over some of the MLA's key functions, but has warned it will have to do a "very focused" job, given the limited resources available.
