4. Library Book Rate – Update on Bill C-509

Following a vote of unanimous support in the House of Commons at third and final reading, Bill C-509 was referred to the Senate. On Thursday 24 March, Senator Donald Neil Platt moved second reading of the Bill in the Senate; but debate was adjourned. The Senate order paper for today (Friday 25 March) indicates that the Bill will resume second reading. However, any further debate on the Bill may be superceded by events in the House of Commons, where MPs are to vote today on an opposition motion that would find the government in contempt of parliament, effectively ending this session of parliament – so off to the polls we will go.

Should parliament be dissolved this weekend, Bill C-509 will die off the order paper; that is, all progress that has been made so far will be void, and the Bill will have to be reintroduced in the next session of parliament, to start the process from the beginning back in the House of Commons.

We will keep monitoring events, and will provide updates as new information becomes available.

The winners of the 2010 CBC Literary Awards were announced by CBC/Radio-Canada, the Canada Council for the Arts and Air Canada's enRoute magazine. Professional and amateur writers from across the country submitted previously unpublished works in the Creative Nonfiction, Poetry and Short Story categories. Twelve entries were selected as winners by the juries: six in English and six in French.

The CBC Literary Awards/Prix littéraires Radio-Canada is the only competition for original, unpublished works in both official languages, providing a forum for authors of all ages to help promote creative writing in Canada.

The Canada Council distributes \$60,000 in prizes to the 12 winners (six in each official language). The works will be published in enRoute magazine, guaranteeing the winning writers a million readers every month.

(i) New Library Building Will House Single Moms

The neediest neighbourhood in Vancouver is getting a new library with housing attached for single mothers and children. Just six blocks from where the city's first public lending library was built at Main and Hastings streets more than a century ago, a new Strathcona library will be built at 720-730 East Hastings.

Like its predecessor, which was built with the assistance of philanthropist Andrew Carnegie in 1903, the new branch is being built with the help of others. In this case the YWCA and several non-profit groups are behind a plan to add up to 20 units of housing for single mothers and their children. To read more go <u>here</u>. (Source: Vancouver Sun)

(ii) Library to Combine with Social Housing on DTES

It's half library, half affordable housing project, and it's coming to Vancouver's Downtown Eastside. The \$12 million building on East Hastings near Heatley should be finished sometime in late 2014. The top four floors will have 15 to 20 suites for single mothers, and in the bottom there will be a 12,000 square foot library.

City librarian Sandra Singh says the two components go together nicely. "We're able to do it in a way that contributes to the broader challenges in Vancouver in creating affordable housing for community members. For us it's a real win-win." For more on this story go <u>here</u>. (Source:NEWS1130)
