1. CLA Responds to CAUT Concerns Regarding LAC

The Canadian Library Association is aware of the concerns being expressed by the Canadian Association of University Teachers about Library and Archives Canada. CAUT has raised 5 main issues facing LAC: modernization, mandate, acquisitions, services and decentralization. CLA is also aware of the Treasury Board's strategic and operating review which is looking for budget reductions of 5-10% in the direct program spending of federal government departments, including LAC.

CLA has responded directly to communications we received from CAUT regarding their concerns. Our letter is reproduced below.

CLA is participating in LAC's Pan Canadian Documentary Heritage Forum meetings and is committed to working with LAC to ensure that our national institution is meeting the needs of the Canadian library community. We recognize the need for Library and Archives Canada to fill a very broad mandate in an environment of decreasing resources.

If CLA members have specific questions or concerns about the CAUT campaign or the issues raised, you are invited to bring them to the attention of Executive Council through me or Executive Director Kelly Moore.





5. Brampton Library set to open New Branch at Mount Pleasant Village



The first new library branch in Brampton in 25 years will open its doors to the public on November 21, 2011.

The Mount Pleasant Village Branch Library, located at 100 Commuter Drive, across from the

Mount Pleasant GO Station, is a partnership between the Library Board, the City of Brampton and the Peel District School Board. The new library has been constructed together with an elementary school, and functions both as a public library for the community and a school library for the students.

"This is an excellent example of how organizations with a shared mandate can come together to provide service to everyone in the community," says Brampton Library Chief Executive Officer Cathy Matyas. "The project is a winwin for all involved, and especially the residents of northwest Brampton."

The new library branch is located in one of the most innovative developments in the Greater Toronto Area. Mount Pleasant Village is a compact urban community that mixes three-storey freehold townhouses and detached homes in a single development. It also incorporates the historic 1902 Brampton CPR railway stations into the design and functional areas of the library and community space.

The new 19,000 sf library has been built on two levels and will open in stages, with the first floor open as of November 21. The second floor, which will house expanded library collections, will open as operating funding is confirmed through the budget process.

Winners of the 75th Governor General's Literary Awards Announced

The Canada Council for the Arts announced the 14 winners of the Governor General's Literary Awards, worth \$25,000 each. Some highlights from this year's announcement:

- Eleven of the 14 winners are receiving the award for the first time;
- The winner in the non-fiction category, Charles Foran, is being recognized for his work about a past GG-winner, Mordecai Richler (1968, 1971);
- The winning author in the French-language non-fiction category, Georges Leroux, also wrote the original version of the book translated by Donald Winkler, which is this year's winner in the

6. A Community Cornerstone



Regina Public Library (RPL) officially opened its new Prince of Wales Branch in October. This state-of-the-art Branch, which was developed in cooperation with the City of Regina, measures around 3,400 square feet – about three times larger than the old Branch. The expanded space allows RPL to offer

more programs, seating and services like wireless internet access. According to Jeff Barber, Regina Public Library Director/CEO, building the new Branch - the first since 1995 - just a few blocks from the previous location, was very important.

"Prince of Wales has always been more than just a Library," said Barber. "It is a community cornerstone of lifelong learning and enjoyment."

Library Board Chair Darlene Hincks Joehnck was very proud that the new Branch was built using only Library Lottery proceeds and donations. "Restoring Our Branches is one of the key priorities outlined in our Strategic Plan," said Hincks Joehnck. "This new Branch allows us to expand our horizons and move in the direction of other new libraries. We now offer new services such as our first comprehensive, self-check location in a beautiful, functional space that will allow us to best serve this community."

The cost of the Branch was around \$1.5 million, but the return on the investment is priceless.

"This Branch is something we all can be proud of," said Barber. "I invite everyone to take the time to enjoy the riches it holds."

7. 24 hour checkout @Library ... the first in Nova Scotia!



As part of ongoing innovations at the new Antigonish Town & County Public Library and with the financial assistance of the Nova Scotia Provincial Library, library patrons can now pick up their books and other materials 24 hours a day. Starting this November - the new outdoor, self-service, book lockers located at the main entrance are open and ready for business. By request, patrons can pick-up their hold-requests after-hours. Individual patrons are temporarily assigned an access code, that when entered, will open a book locker that contains their

requested materials.

"Public Libraries are committed to literacyand reading regularly convenient for the entire community," said Eric Stackhouse, Chief Librarian (Pictou-Antigonish Regional Library). The Antigonish Town & County Library is the first in Nova Scotia to offer a 24-hour accessible book locker for patrons. The funds received to provide the infrastructure for this outdoor book locker were provided as part of a pilot project with the Provincial Library - Communities, Culture & Heritage.
