E-Books Task Force Report and Recommendations

The CLA E-Books Task Force established to investigate has made recommendations regarding the e-book situation in Canada and recommendations on CLA's advocacy role and these are to be found below.

Recommendations

These include adoption and communication of the Key Library Priorities for e-Content and the implementation of e-Content public awareness and advocacy plans for academic and public libraries. These were approved by Executive Council in March 2015 and endorsed by the Canadian Association of Research Libraries (CARL) in May 2015.

Furthermore, CLA has implemented the recommendation to become a signatory to [ReadersFirst](#), an initiative that is "dedicated to ensuring that library users have the same open, easy and free access to e-books that they have come to rely on with physical books", and they have endorsed the TPL/OPL campaign [Fair Pricing for Libraries](#).

Committee of Principals affirms commitment to the internationalisation of RDA

RDA is a package of data elements, guidelines, and instructions for creating library and cultural heritage resource metadata that are well-formed according to international models for user-focussed linked data applications.

RDA has always been a continually evolving standard that aims to reflect the requirements of the cataloguing, metadata and description community.

As we continue to develop the standard it is essential that we broaden the range of perspectives applied to the development of the standard to ensure that it reflects a wide range of different cultural perspectives. The benefit of doing this was envisioned as RDA was developed. As more organisations develop rich and compatible data sets about their holdings, these can be actively shared across the globe to open up and increase the discoverability of collections for the benefit of the users we serve.

Digital Odyssey 2015: *Open Data, Open Heritage*

At Digital Odyssey 2015 "Open Data, Open Heritage", we will examine the intersection of governmental, academic, and community open data and open heritage materials. We will also investigate the roles cultural heritage institutions can and should play in concert with other participants in the emerging open data, open heritage environment.

Governments at the municipal, provincial, and federal level have started to embrace and publish open data for transparency and efficacy. Academics are increasingly facing mandates (and finding incentives) to preserve and share their research data, enabling verification of their results and new insights based on their data. Citizens and community groups want to use open data to inform business decisions and suggest policy directions; other groups want to digitize, preserve, and share their heritage materials to maintain a historical record. Cultural heritage institutions such as libraries and archives have the professional mandate and skills to preserve, organize, and facilitate access to that data.

I have met two types of people. The first type of person has very clear ambition and knows where they want to go or be. "I want to be the CEO of a public library system," for example. And then there are those who, like my friend Susan says, "follow the bread crumb trail of truth." That's me. I don't know where my path is headed, but the last bread crumb I picked up was deciding to begin a Doctorate of Education in Distance Education at Athabasca. Online learning is at the forefront of

change. It will change how we learn, it will change how we work, it will change how we access professional development, and it will change society. Will I become a teacher, a leader in higher education, or something else? I don't know, but I do know that when I have trusted my instincts and applied myself, the world has provided opportunities

Describe what you are passionate about.

I am passionate about my family. I love grilling, gardening, and golf (a perfect weekend has all three). I am passionate about leadership, appreciative inquiry, and creating healthy human systems that enable people to be fully and truly human. I am deeply interested in how privacy and technology are fundamentally changing democratic relations and what it means to be a citizen. And finally, I love libraries.
